LOT 3 - Manufactured in 1914 in solid frame configuration.

LOT 102 - Headline should read: **Second Model.**

LOT 141 - The close-up photo of the receiver belongs with LOT 144.

LOT 144 - The lock has been repaired and has multiple small replacement parts.

LOT 173 - Description should read: scrubbed barrel tang. Circled script "AH" (Asabel Hubbard) cartouche marked on the left stock flat, and circled script "J.A.J.B." (James Andrew Jackson Bradford) cartouche marked on top of the stock comb ahead of the buttplate tang indicating the stock is from a contractor assembled musket c. 1832-1835 along with "W" and "11" indicating conversion to percussion at the Watervliet Arsenal c. 1849-1851.

Condition should read: Fine as assembled and reverted to flintlock configuration (latter per Moller in Jonathan Peck's study of U.S. lock markings which included this lock).

LOT 232 - Photos on page 177 are incorrect and belong with another lot. The photo on page 176 is correct.

LOT 521 - The takedown lever is marked "74" and the hold-open is un-numbered.

LOT 523 - Includes a manual.

LOT 530 - Does not include a cleaning rod or extra magazine.

LOT 561 - Estimate should read: 9,000 - 16,000.

LOT 604 - According to the consignor, Tally scope rings will fit the quarter rib.

LOT 618 - Headline should read: **Pre-64 Winchester/Duane Wiebe Model 70 Bolt Action Rifle.**

LOT 1060 - 5 inch octagon bbl.

LOT 1183 - 30 inch round bbl.

LOT 1208 - Caliber should read: 58 RF.

LOT 1226 - Also included is a copy of "Firearms in the Custer Battle" by Parsons and duMont which features this rifle on the rear cover and notes on pages 42-43 that "Many of the weapons taken

from the Cheyennes and Sioux in 187 are believed to have gone into the United States Cartridge Company collection, which was exhibited at the Smithsonian Institution for a long period. It has been dispersed quite recently, and firearms traced to it or to some other Government collection have a positive claim to usage in the Battle.

LOT 1379 - Manufactured in 1900 as indicated by the included copy of the factory ledger.

LOT 1381 - Headline should read: **Documented Cased Engraved Daniel Fraser & Co. Boxlock Ejector Double Rifle in 9.3x74 R.**

This rifle is pictured and identified in Jonathan Kirton's "Daniel Fraser: Gun and Rifle Maker of Edinburgh, Scotland" on pages 200-203 as well as listed in the specifications on page 268.

LOT 1386 - Caliber should read: .500/416 Nitro.

LOT 1452 - Description should read: Checkered grips with colt medallions.

LOT 1561 - Estimate should read: 2,500 - 3,750.

LOT 1593 - Caliber should read: 9mm Browning Long.

LOT 3007 - The stock and forearm are good overall with moderate handling wear and a crack in the wrist.

LOT 3111 - Cartouche photo in catalog belongs with LOT 3112.

LOT 3112 - Cartouche photo in catalog belongs with LOT 3113.

LOT 3134 - The lock is a replacement.

LOT 3172 - There is a spliced repair along the bottom of the buttstock.

LOT 3231 - Includes a nickel plated U.S. socket bayonet and leather sling.

LOT 3551 - Lot also includes a waterproof plastic 1911 "invasion cover".

LOT 3573 - The grips are numbered "365" matching the pistol.

LOT 3597 - Slide is dated "1942"
